#### Our Mission





#### CARITAS COMMITTEE

Thank you for your generous support of our October Caritas collection. Our recipient organization was the Samaritas, a Christian organization with the motto, "Serving people as an expression of the love of Christ," Samaritas is the largest refugee organization in Michigan. The Ann Arbor office was opened in 2017 to serve refugees from Iraq, Syria, and the Congo. These refugees have lost everything and are working hard to start a new life for themselves and their families. Samaritas helps the refugees find and furnish housing, attend English classes, and enroll children in school. It helps adults find employment, provides rides to various appointments, and helps the refugees acclimate to American life.

Through your sacrificial gifts we were able to send them a generous donation of \$1050. We also were able to distribute \$1050 to Dexter Family Services and \$1015 to the Parish Christian Service Fund; \$525 to Flint, and \$\$525 to Catholic Social Services.

# THE RITE OF WELCOME

On Sunday, November 5 St. Joseph Parish welcomed seven people as Candidates in the RCIA process. They knocked on the door seeking entrance to our faith, they were welcomed by Fr. Brendan and led down to the front of the worship space. Each person answered the question "What do you ask of God's Church" with "Confirmation and Full Communion in the Catholic Church" followed by the question "What does this period of formation offer you?". Each person responded to that question with "An understanding of the Catholic faith". The community agreed to accept them and to support them through their period of continued study. Next came Fr. Brendan signing them with the Sign of the Cross, the presentation of the cross and the signing of the senses by each sponsor to their RCIA person.

After Fr. Brendan's homily the Candidates were presented with a bible and led out of church for Breaking Open the Word which they will do each week now until the Easter Vigil. During Breaking Open the Word the Candidates will come to see how Scripture plays a role in their lives and how it is God's way of communicating with us and leading us in the right direction.

We ask that you keep our Candidates in your prayers as they grow in faith and in their relationship with God and understanding of the Catholic Way of Life.

#### The Responsorial Psalm

After the first reading at Mass, a piece of music known as the "Responsorial Psalm" is sung. The name refers to the structure of the musical composition (responsorial: a leader sings verses while the whole congregation listens, then takes part by singing a refrain in response) and the origin of the text (psalm: a poem intended for singing, taken from the biblical Book of Psalms). The Church describes the responsorial psalm as "an integral part of the Liturgy of the Word" with "great liturgical and pastoral importance, since it fosters meditation on the Word of God."

Since psalms are sung prayers, the liturgical documents of the Church express a preference that the responsorial psalm be sung rather than recited, "at least as far as the people's response is concerned." Each Sunday and Weekday Mass has a specified psalm (most often, actually, a selection of a few verses from a longer psalm) and response given in the *Lectionary*, the book from which the scripture readings are read at Mass. These psalms and responses generally correspond thematically to one or more of the scripture readings from the *Lectionary*, especially the first reading and the reading from the Gospel. Because they are to be used at particular Masses, these psalms and responses are called "proper psalms," or are said to be "proper" to that day's Mass.

In order that people may sing the response more easily, the Church also provides "common" psalms and responses: texts chosen suitable to the different times of the year and the different categories of saints, rather than to the specific day's readings. These may be used instead of the text corresponding to the reading whenever the psalm is sung.

At the Sunday Masses during Advent at St. Joseph this year, we will sing a setting of the common response for the Advent season: "Come, O Lord, and set us free!" This refrain echoes Revelation 22:20, and celebrates three comings of Christ: his coming as an infant human at Christmas, his coming in glory at the end of time, and his coming as our nourishment in the Word and the Eucharist at Mass. You may want to make this refrain part of your daily prayer during these days of Advent.

#### How Do I Handle the Holidays When I am Grieving?



When you have lost a loved one through death, the holiday season can be most painful. It brings painful memories of your loved one and a terrible loss that you feel. It is difficult to get excited when the loved one is not here.

Rather than being a time of family togetherness, sharing and thanksgiving, holidays can bring feelings of sadness, loss and emptiness.

Since love does not end with death, holidays may result in a renewal sense of personal grief. Society encourages us to join in the holiday spirit, but all around you the sounds, sights, smells trigger memories of the person who is no longer with you. Recognize that the holidays will not be the same. Be patient with yourself as your resistance is lower. Grief is and can be very stressful.

St. Joseph Family Grief Ministry will be offering two sessions to address some ways we can help you cope with the holidays. There are a few steps that you can take to perhaps help the holidays have new or different meaning.

Recognize that the holidays will not be the same. Do what is comfortable for you and your family.






#### Boy Scout Troop 456 News

I have rosy cheeks and a voice full of laughter;


But no nail—scarred hands or a promise of the hereafter.
